Reasons

- The proposed provision of open space is inadequate. The open space is proposed to be located at a distance from the apartment block where it is unlikely to be used by the occupants; no details of the agreement to acquire the said area that would comprise the proposed open space appear to have been submitted. The proposed development is therefore unacceptable.
- Development Plan standards require 10 no.off street parking spaces. However, due to the sites proximity to Tallaght Town Centre and a QBC, the Roads Department would accept a reduction of up to 10% i.e. 9 car spaces. The proposed development would provide an inadequate level of off street parking spaces (7 no. spaces) and would lead to on street parking which would endanger public safety by reason of a traffic hazard or obstruction of road users.
- The proposed structure would be within 5 metres of the 450mm trunk foul sewer running through/adjacent to the site. The proposed development would therefore be prejudicial to public health.
- An unacceptable level of information has been submitted in respect of the existing and proposed site services layout. The proposed development would therefore be prejudicial to public health.
