In pursuance of its Functions under the above mentioned Act the Dublin County Council, being the planning Authority for the County Health District of Dublin, did by order 2/987/69 dated 20th June, 1969 make a decision pursuant to Section 26(1) of the Act refusing permission for:

Proposed two bungalows at Mount Venue Road, Rockbrook.

(1) There are no public piped water or severage facilities available to serve the proposal.

(2) The proposed development would be premature by reason of the said existing deficiency in the provision of public piped sewerage facilities and the period within which such deficiency may reasonably be expected to be made good.
