

"I'd also say, look at how

in football compared to hurl-

in football compared to hurl-ing. So if the Dublin model was the right way to go ing. So if the Dublin model was the right way to go they'd have six All-Ireland hurling Championships in a row — but they don't. When was the last time Dublin won an All-Ireland hurling final?

"We can go down through Under-20 and minor and the whole lot, but in senior hurling the model hasn't produced the same level of success as

the same level of success as in football, for lots of reasons.

"It's a more complicated equation than simply looking at the amount of money invested abso-

lutely in a county. In my view, you always have to look at the relative per capita amount that's been invested.

that's been invested.

"If in 2040, the population and its density and its spread has changed significantly, we're going to be having the same conversation if we stick with the old model and the old ways of doing things.

"There will have to be an increase in the coaching in urban centres if the population grows in those areas. It's a simple fact.

a simple fact.

"It's not an equalisation driven by labels saying Antrim, Down. Kerry, Cork, but an equalisation of where the population is and where

the population is and where the requirement is.

"These big questions are hopefully what Larry McCarthy and this Strategic Review are going to consider. We've put our thoughts on the table on that and it's a big conversation that is going on.
"That's the significant

cant question for Gaelic games – the change in population and demographic movements on "On top of that, the

potential for a change in the way the island is governed, north and south, and its relationship with Britain – that's going to change dramatically over the next 40 years.
