

PLANNING NOTICES

DUBLIN CITY COUNCIL Frank Cleary intend to apply for planning permission to demolish an existing 2-storey building containing a bar, restaurant, bookmakers and take-away and construction of a new commercial / residential mixed-use development, consisting of a 5-storey over basement structure containing 240 sq m hospitality commercial unit at ground level with a 142 sq m basement, a 100 sq m retail unit at ground level, 48 no. apartments over 4 stories with balconies (3 no. 2-bed, 1 no. 2-bed, 14 no. 1-bed units), public and communal open space at first floor plaza level, communal open space at fourth floor level, pedestrian access at Main Street and Ballycall Road, a total of 31 car parking spaces and 110 bicycle parking spaces at ground level, vehicular access from Main Street and vehicular access to Ballycall Road, waste storage, ancillary and development works associated services and landscaping, all at The Bottom of the Hill, Bar, Main Street & Ballycall Road, Finglas, Dublin 11, adjacent to a proposed structure (RPS no. 2669 in the Dublin City Development Plan 2016-2021). The planning application may be inspected or purchased at a fee not exceeding the reasonable cost of making a copy, at the offices of the planning authority, during its public opening hours and a submission or observation in relation to the application may be made in writing to the Planning Authority, in payment of a fee of €20 within 5 weeks of receipt of the application by the Planning Authority and such submissions or observations will be considered by the Planning Authority in making a decision on the application. The Planning Authority may grant permission subject to or without conditions or may refuse to grant permission.

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DARTS AN ALLY PALLY ENCORE

BARNEY IS BACK

RAYMOND van Barneveld makes an emotional encore at Alexandra Palace tonight admitting he took the final curtain too hastily.

Barney rode into the sunset in a monumental strop two years ago, vowing he would "never forgive" himself after a shock defeat by Darrin Young at the PDC World Championship. But after a short-lived retirement, the people's champion is back - and if he beats Filipino 500-1 outsider Laurence Bagay, a heavyweight second-round clash of former world champions against Rob Cross awaits on Thursday. And you know Barney is back because he said: "I'm still a sore b***** when I lose". At 34, van Barneveld has proved he is prepared to graft for another taste of glory after battling through Q school to regain his PDC Tour card last winter.

Mirror

He seems more at ease with the world now, saying: "I can look at myself in the mirror and say, 'You're a five-times world champion, nothing can go wrong now'". "When I announced my retirement I was hoping to get some good results and say goodbye to my fans. "But I didn't qualify for the Grand Prix, the Matchplay or the Grand Slam and I wasn't picked for the World Cup. That hurt as well. I wanted to say goodbye but in the rankings I wasn't high enough. "Then it was such a shock to go out so early at Ally Pally. I never thought Darrin would beat me but he got one dart at tops and bang! "I was thinking, 'This can't be right, it is a joke. This is not real'. "I felt sad inside. I was hurt, I was emotional. It was not the best year of my life. "I wasn't myself, it was a disaster for people around me. You keep losing, you keep losing faith. I was devastated by that last World Championship. "I was trying to visualise what it must feel like to lift that trophy again and be in the final, but the floor was literally gone beneath my feet. I thought, 'Wow is this really the end?' "Eventually I realised
