SPORTWASHED GAMES SHAME

FORGET the Chinese New Year of the Tiger – this is really the Year of the Sportswash.

And it kicked off yesterday amid a flurry of fireworks and fanfare in a sub-zero Beijing.

From the fake snow of a Winter Olympics staged in China to a desert World Cup in Qatar that finishes days before Christmas, this will be a year like no other for the rogue nations of sport.

And when you chuck in the hundreds of millions being splashed by Saudis on Newcastle and golf tournaments, then 2022 looks rather grubby.

In the wrong hands, top-level sport is used as a political tool.

A chance to erase or forget about a country's appalling human rights atrocities. A chance for oppressive leaders or regimes to restore their reputations globally.

And the next 16 days of competition in superpower China will be no different.

IOC president Thomas Bach stood side by side with Chinese president Xi Jinping at yesterday's opening ceremony at the Bird's Nest as Russian president Vladimir Putin watched on.

Even before a curling stone had been launched, these controversial Games had been influenced and underpinned by politics.

Several governments did not send representatives, in a political boycott supported by the United States, the UK, Canada, India, Australia and Holland.

It comes amid allegations of genocide against Uyghurs and other mainly Muslim minorities in the Xinjiang province, with claims of forced labour, rape, sexual abuse and sterilisation.

And it comes amid the ongoing repression of Hong Kong and Tibet and the locking up of journalists and dissenters.

And it comes amid sexual assault allegations by tennis star Peng Shuai against a former politician, which resulted in her disappearance from public view.

The IOC have had their heads in the snow since Beijing was named as the first city in 126 years to host a summer and winter Games.

Rob Koehler of pressure group Global Athlete says Olympic chiefs deserve all the

criticism and not the stars taking part.

Koehler told SunSport: "I blame the IOC for putting athletes in this position. In 2008, the Games were being used for a change to China, to improve human rights."

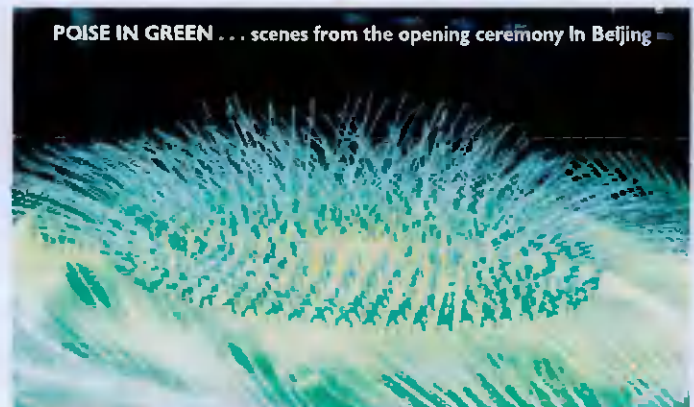
The IOC knew the issues going into 2022 when they were bidding. They allowed them to host the Games. Shame on them."

UNITED RUGBY CHAMPIONSHIP

ROBERT BALOUCOUNE turned on the style to score two brilliant tries and send Ulster top of the URC.

It was a timely reminder from the winger to Andy Farrell just what he is capable of.

The 24-year-old — released from the Ireland squad along with full-back Michael Lowry — beat four defenders before the break to score under the posts, sending Ulster into a 21-5 interval lead.

And Baloucoune popped up in the fourth minute of stoppage time to collect a crosskick from Billy Burns and secure the bonus point in the last play.

The released duo were superb at Kingspan, constantly forcing Connacht back as the visitors tried to prevent a fourth loss in a row against a team who had won their last three.

Andy Friend had looked for a big start from his men after their dismal showing against Glasgow last weekend.

But his fear of shipping 70 if they played as badly again looked like being realised when they fell 14-0 behind after 21 minutes.

It could have been worse for Connacht but they managed to hold Ulster scoreless when winger Peter Sullivan was binned for a shoulder to Lowry's head after less than three minutes.

The pressure told moments later when flanker Greg Jones got over after 14 minutes.

Then hooker Declan Moore, signed on loan from Munster, crowned his debut when he bulldozed over after 21 minutes.

Oran McNulty, who replaced Sullivan after he was injured in the challenge which led to him being binned, pulled back a try for Connacht after a good build-up but Baloucoune's try in first-half stoppage was a killer blow.

The western province managed to pull back a try when winger Alex Wootton got his 14th in 29 appearances.

And while they rarely looked like rescuing the game, they defended superbly at times.

A Nathan Doak penalty made it a double-scores game before the fourth try came in minute of stoppage time after Cian Prendergast was binned and Baloucoune crowned a fine display with his second.
