Without the technology South was forced to guess' to bid 4/H hearts rather than 3NT and play with the room! Amongst top tournament players the rebid for the South hand is 2C, Gazilli, asking North for more information and thus the lay down 3NT might be reached.

Anyway West led the Jack of spades being

Anyway West led the Jack of spades being careful not to lead away from an honour, a good plan, noted by South. At one table, declarer counted the tricks, at another declarer won the spade, drew trumps without thought and failed. The tricks on view were two spades, six hearts and one club for NINE tricks. The tenth could come from a club finesse or making a diamond

The odds favoured going after a diamond trick, this only failing if East held Ace and King, an improbability based on the opening lead. Entries to enjoy the established diamond needed to be preserved so declarer won the spade with the King in hand and played a diamond to the Jack and East's Ace. East returned a club on which declarer played the careful nine, losing to West's Jack. A spade exit was now won with the Ace and a heart led to the Queen for another diamond towards table. This time West won with the King and returned a trump, won by dummy's Jack. The Queen of diamonds was a parking place for the Queen of clubs. A club to the Ace now allowed declarer to draw the last trump and claim.
