ADRIAN MERONK made history in Ireland - and admitted there was no place he would have

was no place he would have preferred to do it.

Meronk yesterday triumphed at the Horizon Irish Open at Mount Juliet, becoming the first Polish golfer to win an event on the European Tour. He said: "I love it. I love it. I'm not stopping, I'm gonna keep going forward and it's just another step for me. I'm super excited to win here in Ireland, such a great history. I can't describe it."

Meronk birdied the 15th and 16th and then holed from 25 feet on the par-five 17th for an eagle, as he carded a closing 66 to finish 20 under par in Kilkenny, three shots clear of New Zealand's Ryan Fox.

South Africa's Thriston Lawrence finished third on 16 under.

Scotland's David Law, American John Catlin and Paraguay's Fabrizio Zanotti shared fourth on 15 under to claim the three places on offer at The Open at St Andrews, which starts in ten days' time.

Meronk — who had recorded three top-three finishes in last six starts — added: "It's such a relief, to be honest."

"T've been coming quite close a couple of times this year and to finally open the door is just a dream come true. That's why we practise every day and I'm super happy."

Asked about being a role model to a generation of Polish players, Meronk, 29, told Sky Sports: "I was imagining this picture yesterday, what it might look like and it looked exactly how I imagined it and it was an unbelievable feeling.

"To hit such a good shot on the last hole, I'm super proud of myself and my caddie."

Offaly's Shane Lowry – who birdied the last four holes on Friday to make the cut with a shot to spare – carded weekend rounds of 68 and 67 to finish in a tie for ninth.

Three-time Major winner and new-

ly-crowned US Senior Open champion Pádraig Harrington began his final round with five straight birdies and went to the turn in 30.

But he took seven on the tenth and eventually signed for a 69 to finish joint 30th in a group of seven, which also included Séamus Power.

Power finished with a 68 while Niall Kearney carded a 70 to finish on four under and tied for 58th.

Casey is defector

PAUL CASEY has joined the rebel LIV Golf tour despite previously declaring he would be a "hypocrite" if he played the Saudi International. Former Unicef ambassador Casey, 44, is due to tee up at the third Saudibacked LIV event at Trump National Bedminster in

National Bedminster New Jersey on July 29. The Englishman's deci-

sion is at odds with his previous stance, when he refused to play the European Tour's Saudi International over concerns about country's human

rights record. In March 2019, Casey said: "It just didn't sit well with me.
"I've not talked too

much about it - but certainly signing a deal and being paid to be down there, I would be a hypo-crite if I did that."

But world No 26 Casey, who has not played since March due to a back injury, now claims "excited" by the "excited" by the team-based LIV series.

He said: "I'm looking forward to the team element. Golf can very much be a team sport. I'm excited about it."

Casey began his turncoat journey in 2021 having played the last two Saudi Internationals which is now part of the Asian Tour. He said in November 2020: "I wasn't comfortable going in the past but I have always been open-minded and

willing to learn."

He will join former
