

Bladdest man on the planet

FIGHTING fit Peter Wright says his gallbladder agony wrecked his year as world champion. The Scottish star failed

to win a tournament since taking his second world title at the Alexandra Pal-

ace in early January. Wright, 52, admitted that constant pain hampered his hopes of more glory.

Now he has had the gallbladder removed and said: "I've been in a lot of pain. I said I was feeling fine at the World Match-play in July, but deep down I wasn't.

"The pain was irritating and when you're taking painkillers, you're not going to be 100 per cent. "The doc said I should

have had it out ten years ago, so I'm glad it's done.
"I'm not sure whether
I'm going to get demol-ished or if I'm going to hit

the ground running."
Wright plays in the German Open tonight against either Raymond van Bar-neveld or lan White.

Salisbury, who splits a prize pot of \$700,000 with Ram, has overcome painful back issues this summer to secure a fifth Major doubles crown.

He said: "This is pretty crazy. I can't believe we're standing here again.



George could be king at Monza

GEORGE RUSSELL is up for hearing a remix of national anthem tomorrow with 'God Save The King' set to play if he can win the Italian Grand Prix.

The Mercedes man was third-quickest in the morning session and P4 in the afternoon practice

British racer Russell, who was second last weekend at the Dutch GP, was in impressive form while his team-mate Lewis Hamilton faces an uphill task to end his wait for his first win of the season.

Russell said: "FPI looked strong but then Ferrari and Red Bull looked to have taken a step forward so we have a bit of work to do."

Hamilton is likely to start no higher than 18th place owing to a host of grid penalties for an unscheduled engine change.

But even with the new power unit in the back of the car, he was not as quick as Ferrari or Red Bull.

Hamilton said: "We made some set-up changes, nothing major but they went a lot quicker."

major but they went a lot quicker."

Ferrari's Carlos Sainz, who was quickest in second practice, also has the same punishment for the same rule breach.

And AlphaTauri's Yuki Tsunoda is facing a hefty knucklewrap for failing to slow for yellow flags and driving without a seatbelt at Zandvoort.

Championship leader Max Verstappen is also facing a penalty of five places but still looking favourite for the win.

The runaway Dutchman has a 109-point lead in the championship over Charles Leclerc and his team-mate Sergio Perez, who are tied in second place.

Meanwhile, Porsche have pulled the plug on their plans to join F1 with Red Bull.

The German car brand was seeking a 50 per cent stake in the Milton Keynes-based F1 team.

However, talks have now bro-

ken down with Red Bull boss Christian Horner saying the two companies had "quite different DNA".

Drinks brand Red Bull have Drinks brand Red Bull have invested millions on building their own engine department and plan to run their own power units from 2026.

And Horner says the deal did not stack up with Red Bull unwilling to see the business split 50-50.

He said: "With Red Bull

spin 50-50. He said: "With Red Bull becoming a powertrain manu-facturer in 2026, it was always

natural to hold discussions.
"Those discussions have now

been concluded.

"And the consensus was that it was not right for Red Bull's involvement in FI.

"It's a tremendously exciting new chapter for Red Bull. "Porsche is a great brand but the DNA is quite different."
