MOTHER OF ALL WINS...
Kerins O'Rahillys goalscorer Barry John Keane celebrates their Munster final triumph with his mother Kayrena

THE January forecast for Strand Road is bright — but David Moran feared that last Saturday's winter sun might obscure the path to a historic win for Kerins O'Rahillys.

The efforts of the Tralee men to claim the Munster club SFC title were eclipsed by the first-half performance of a determined Newcastle West side.

Limerick's champions took a 0-4 to 0-3 lead into half-time, with O'Rahillys failing to score from play as they struggled to feed full-forward Tommy Walsh.

On a clear and crisp afternoon in Mal-low, the glare of the low sun hindered their attempts to supply quality ball to the ex-Kerry star.

But the change of ends afforded them a clearer view of their target man, who had a hand in both second-half goals that set up a 2-6 to 1-8 victory.

Moran admitted: "We hadn't played that well in the first half but with only a point in it we were still well in contention.

"We knew we were capable of better and that the result would look after itself if we upped the performance level.

"Newcastle West are a very good team and it was exceptionally difficult playing into the sun in the first half. It was very hard to see so we couldn't really get a kicking game going.

"It was easier to do it in the second half and we got a bit of joy from it.

"Tommy was obviously very good winning the ball we were sending into the square."

After scoring the Kingdom club's first goal shortly after the restart, Moran's old inter-county team-mate Walsh teed up

Barry John Keane to fire in their second five minutes later.

Newcastle West hit three late points to pave the way for a grandstand finish.

But O'Rahillys held on for the win to secure the first provincial crown in the club's history.

Walsh recently of their desire to shed the 'nearly men' tag — and a third one-point win in a row suggests that they now know what it takes to handle tight games and big occasions.

O'Rahillys reached championship and league finals in Kerry in 2021, only to suffer defeats to Austin Stacks and Dingle respectively.

Conquering Munster has gone a long way towards erasing the painful memories of those failures for captain Ross O'Callaghan.

He explained: "I'm just so proud of the lads for this. After all the times we've been there or thereabouts, it's great to finally get over the line.

"A first Munster title for the club — it's huge.

"We've come on massively as a group. After losing two finals last year, we've learned about what's needed when the game is in the melting pot.

"Maybe we don't make it easy for ourselves at times but it's great to be able to get over the line anyway."

O'Callaghan, 32, and Moran, 34, are surviving members of the club's only previous appearance in a Munster final in 2009.

Thirteen years later, they can finally

close the book on the 0-7 to 0-6 loss to Kilmurphy-Ibrickane of Clare.

O'Callaghan admitted: "That final used to come into my head every couple of weeks.

"It's great to bury that hatchet now with nearly a whole new group.

"You're probably too young back then to realise how precious these moments are until you actually experience them. It's unbelievable to get there in the end.

"The lift that this is after giving the club is going to last for a long, long time after this. The whole thing has been brilliant.

"There are a lot of young lads in the panel who will be playing for the seniors for years to come. This gives them something to build on."

The only item on the agenda for Kerins O'Rahillys before Christmas is to continue basking in the glory of their achievement as it surely beats anything that Santa Claus might bring.

But with an All-Ireland semi-final against a very strong Kilmacud Crokes side less than four weeks away, the sun has not set on their season just yet.

Moran (above) added: "To experience something like this with your club, there's a combination of it being an unreal feeling but also a massive relief.

"It's nice to go one step further and that will obviously bring its own challenges. But that's for another day.

"Winning a Munster title with your club is something to celebrate. We'll enjoy Christmas now first."
