

Products and services

- Growing Strawberries
- It is the intention of Annette and Alan Ritchie to seek permission for strawberry farming.
- This will consist of strawberries being grown in polytunnels.
- Tunnel production
- Tunnel production utilizing polythene film supported by semi-circular steel frames to cover the raised beds is widely used in Europe and helps to bring forward harvest by around 1 month and also to extend the season.
- Intend to use either white plastic which keeps plants cooler in the summer months or black plastic or fleece to warm them in the spring and maintain a higher heat in the summer. Drip tape is employed under the plastic to facilitate irrigation and fertigation. Plants will be grown in bags filled with the desired soil mix or substrate which are then placed on top of the ground.
- Table top systems, where the plants are grown in a plastic tray or gutter system, suspended on wires 1.5m above the ground, benefit from the use of closed irrigation and fertigation systems that provide a continuous, balanced supply of nutrient to the plants.
- Soil requirements for strawberries
- Strawberries have no specific requirements in terms of soil type, tunnels will be well drained and relatively flat with no frost pockets.
- Light or sandy soils do have advantages in that harvest is earlier, helping the grower catch an early market. These soils also have fewer problems with root diseases.
- Strawberries are best planted in spring so they will be well-rooted by the following winter. Containers can be replanted in late summer and moved to a cool, protected place such as an unheated garage during the coldest months.

When to Grow Strawberries

<u>Plant out September – November or mid March</u>

You can buy transplants or plug plants of strawberries in early Spring and plant them directly out in the ground in mid March. However best results are achieved when plants are planted in September of the previous year as this gives the plant's roots a chance to develop. Strawberries are quiet hardy but in severe frost make sure you cover your rows with a fleece.

Where to Grow Strawberries

Sunny location, avoid frost pockets & wind

If you choose to grow your strawberries outdoors in the soil then choose a well sheltered spot, free of frost. In Winter the dormant strawberry plant can survive the cold but as they grow and flower in Spring they become very susceptible to the cold. Plant perpetual verities in March.

How to Plant Strawberries

Prepare soil well before planting, adding well rotted farm yard manure. Ensure all of

While the season is extended through the use of different protective structures (glasshouses, tunnels, etc.), the use of cold-stored strawberry plant technology also plays a vital role.

The plants will begin to fruit approximately 60 days later. The volume of strawberry plants planted will depend on the amount of fruit the grower needs for their markets. This technology, combined with the use of different protective structures, has allowed the strawberry season to be extended up until November.




